Grace and peace to you, the people of Tuscola,

Summer is flying by. June has been full of VBS, vacations, busy food pantry days, family gatherings, and many different group meetings in the church. 

Are you keeping cool? As I write this morning, the temperature is projected to reach 93 degrees! Already we are having to water our garden. Might our rain stop, too, if we do not change our ways and give God, and the world he gave us, priority over all else?


On the afternoon of June 23, I attended the program on Trauma and Resiliency held at the church. Did you know that the top ten causes of death in the young are related to trauma? Not all bad things that happen to us cause trauma but not having the coping skills can. Did you know trauma is passed through the DNA due to a change in a particular body chemical and this change can pass through three generations? Those are just some of the things I learned! I urge you to attend these programs hosted by the Christian Justice team and the United Women in Faith. Each one of them has informed and caused me to think about my world and myself in a new light. These programs are one way we can learn how to be in conversation with each other and the more we are in conversation, the more the divisions in this world will disappear.

The **Finance** committee met on 6/17/2024 and Dave Butler, treasurer, reported that we are now in the black by \$203. The net income and expense trends are still good. Pastor Bennett contacted some other churches to look for another individual to help with the audit but with no luck yet. Dick Berg, chair, requested that a report be generated with the previous year's electricity payments by month so we can determine if the new lights have made a difference. SAM Pantry received a large donation during the month. Their board would like the ability to access their funds at Edward Jones more readily. Dave will make sure the CDs mature on a rotating basis every 90 days.

At the **Trustee** meeting on June 20, it was decided to contact Arrow Glass to look at the windows in the hall off the library to determine why they leaked during a driving rain. The new faucets have been installed in the church kitchen and seem to be working fine. An organization called "Faith in Place" helps churches to create teams to implement "green" practices such as doing energy efficient measures, reducing the need for mowing, etc. A representative will be coming to speak with us in July. The advantage to partnering with this organization is that we can receive free or major discounts on items or services. The faucet in the upstairs bath in the parsonage was replaced by Pastor Bennett.

Addy Ring and her grandparents, Steve and Patty Slaughter, did weeding, trimmed bushes, etc. around the parsonage. Addy hopes to go into landscaping and wanted some practical experience. The Trustees thank them for their work. The Fellowship hall has been rented for three weekends in July. Pastor Bennett reported there are issues with the sound system. The equalizer has failed, the sound board is losing channels and the microphones are outdated. It was thought a fundraiser might be a good way to pay for these upgrades. Pastor Kim is researching accessibility grants that would allow the church to install automatic doors for the front entrance. When school starts, the use of some rooms in the education wing will be shifted around. SAM Pantry would like to purchase an outdoor refrigerator and Pastor Kim will look for a grant to help with the purchase.
