Dear Church Family:

This month is the 285th anniversary one of the most important events in our denomination's history: Aldersgate. It's possible that many of you have never heard this term before, but perhaps you've noticed that there are a lot of United Methodist Churches named Aldersgate UMC. This isn't by accident. It's a reference to the true beginning of the Methodist religion.

John Wesley, our denomination's founding father, was an Anglican priest in England in the 1720s. After he was ordained, he became a Fellow at Oxford University where his brother Charles still attended. Charles and several of his friends approached John at some point because they no longer felt connected to God through the Church of England. John and Charles formed the "Holy Club", a club for members who wanted to better connect to God through prayer, fasting, and reading scripture. Many people mocked them for their "methodical" approach to church – hence the name Methodists!

Like so many pastors, John felt called to change the world, but he got off to a rocky start. He decided that his call was in America – Georgia specifically – working with Native Americans. While traveling across the Atlantic, a huge storm began to pummel the ship. John was terrified, but he noticed one group of people – a religious order called the Moravians – continued to pray and sing joyfully through the danger. John was so impressed with their faith and the Holy Spirit that seemed to pour out from them, that he began to study under this religion. After just over two years in Georgia, John Wesley fled back to England in disgrace. He had been unable to minister to the Native population as more and more European settlers arrived and more clergy was needed. But the worst thing that happened to John Wesley was falling in love with the wrong woman. After his sweetheart married another man, he refused to serve communion to her, and legal proceedings were filed. He was forced to leave America without making the changes he so desperately wanted to make.

John was at one of the lowest moments of his life. He continued to study under the Moravians, but he never felt God's Holy Spirit the way they did. He so longed for a powerful, spiritual experience, but the more he tried to find it, the more elusive it was.

On May 24, 1738, John found himself at a Moravian worship service. He later wrote:


"In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's Preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation, and an assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

This moment changed Wesley's entire spiritual outlook, and one week later, he preached one of his most powerful sermons on faith. John Wesley dedicated his life to preaching to those who couldn't come to church because they worked in mines or factories. He spent his days working with the poor in the darkest parts of London. And when he died, the founder of the United Methodist Church was described as "the best-loved man in England."

On Sunday, May 21st, we will celebrate our Methodist heritage and founding father John Wesley. I hope that knowing more about our leader will help you better understand what United Methodism is all about.

### **S**ermons

Sermon Series: The Power of Borrowed Prayers –One of the things I hear most often from church members is, "I don't know how to pray." Many of us have been fortunate enough to hear someone who has a truly powerful gift of prayer, and the rest of us muddle through, our words totally inadequate to describe the glory, power, and mercy of God. We are very lucky, though, that many of the world's best pray-ers have written down their words for us to use. This spring, we will examine some of the most beautiful and meaningful prayers ever written including The Lord's Prayer, the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi, The Covenant Prayer by John Wesley, The Prayer of Serenity by Reinhold Niebuhr, and The Trinity Prayer by St. Ethelwold. These prayers give rise to our deepest voice and allow us to say the things we've always longed to say, but feel unable to write ourselves.

May 7th – James 1:5-8; 3:13-18 – The Power of Borrowed Prayers: The Serenity Prayer by Reinhold Niebuhr

May 14th - Exodus 13:17-18; 20-22 - The Power of Borrowed Prayers: Lead Me by Thomas Merton

May 21st – Aldersgate Sunday – Mark 12:28-34a; Romans 5:1-11 – The Cross or The Flame?

May 28th – Pentecost Sunday - John 20:19-23 – The Power of Borrowed Prayers: Indwelling of the Spirit by St. Augustine of Hippo

WHERE: The Smith House – Tuscola


COST: \$20/per person

**Good morning!** 

As I write this, the sun is shining and it is calm and beautiful outside my window but shortly the weather is to change. Tomorrow calls for storms and even today the wind is to pick up once more. Extreme weather seems to be rampant nowadays. We wonder where God is in all the weather chaos of this world. But it is not just the weather that seems to be in chaos. Just a few days ago there was another mass shooting of young people in our country. Political division in




our nation threatens to tear us apart. There has been an overthrow of another government in an overseas country. Where is the love that Jesus preached so long ago? Have we forgotten His admonition to "love your neighbor as yourself"? We cry out to God as we wonder how we have arrived at this place in our history. But is it God's fault? No, we must look inwardly at our own motivations. If we are truly the Christians we profess to be, we would be following Jesus' teachings and example not our own desires. Jesus tells us this in John 14:15, "If you love me, keep my commands."

Trustees met and, as usual, had many items to discuss. SAM pantry had 61 participants which equates to 20 families. The search for an individual or individuals to replace Margie Delheimer as coordinator of the pantry continues. Pastor Terri reported that the church is in the process of becoming a Narcan (generic name Naloxone) distribution site. Narcan can block or reverse the effects of an opioid overdose which can occur from an illegal drug such as heroin or from prescription medicines such as OxyContin or Percocet. Information regarding this state-funded initiative is being passed out when SAM pantry is open. The farm rental lease has been signed with Toby Ring at \$290/acre (In April's newsletter, I erroneously reported the rent was \$300/acre). The ropes around the parking lot will be removed to facilitate mowing. After discussion of the merits of several different robot vacuums, it was decided to test the concept before purchase with an unused vacuum belonging to a member of the trustees. TUWF's goal for the purchase of a commercial refrigerator and ice maker has been met! Research by a subcommittee of that group will be done to determine the best appliances for their needs and their recommendations will be sent to trustees. The number of color copies has been reduced so no action on purchasing a new copier will be made at this time. Parts of the sidewalk leading from the parking lot to the portico are uneven and are a tripping hazard. Bruce Wood will explore the cost of having those sections jacked up. It was noted that many shingles have blown off the roof recently due to the strong winds and must be replaced. Interest has been expressed in using some of the church grounds for gardens for individuals. If this is something you are curious about, please contact Bruce Wood or Karen Benner. The church now has four mowing teams! However, we can always use substitutes and even another team so talk to Bruce if you are available. As trustees search for ways to increase the number of individuals participating in spring clean-up and the weeding of the beds around the church in general, we are considering dividing the beds into small plots that can be "adopted" by individuals or families. We hope this will make the weeding more manageable and create healthy competition amongst the participants. Who can keep their bed the cleanest! This could be an opportunity to teach your children about stewardship. Please let Bruce or Karen know what you think of this approach.

Treasurer Dave Butler reported to the **Finance** committee that income kept pace with expenses during March. The income/expense graph is below.

**SPRC** met this month and discussed personnel issues.
