Grace and peace to you, the people of Tuscola,


The New Year is here. The cold weather will be here a while longer, but this is the perfect time for us to work on ourselves and help ourselves grow. This is where the tradition of New Year's resolutions comes from. We want to better ourselves, whether that is eating better, working out more, saying we will learn something new, or reading X number of books this year. We all want to do better. The Church also tries to do this look at what worked last year and what we want to do this year. So, if this is a good idea and we should set resolutions or plans for the year, why don't they always work out for us? Why can we not stick with the goals we have set?

In a video titled "Your Theme," the YouTube educator CGP Gray argues that we set the goals the wrong way. Because for many, when we set a goal, we set it specifically to what we want, and every step of the way, it is a point where the resolution could break, "like I will read one book a week." Every week, you have an opportunity to fail. CGP Gray argues that we should set a theme for the year. A goal that is specific enough to get us to be the healthier person we want to be but not so strict that we will never be able to achieve the goal. For example, instead of saying I will read a book of week this year, say that this year or this season will be a year of reading, set up the space to read, line up books you would like to read. This helps us accomplish the goal or resolution where upon examination of the year or season you can say yes, I have read more than I have in years past.

CGP Gray argues that the Data would bear this out, that specific data point don't matter when you are looking at overall data the trend line is what matters. This is why more health applications, or trainers now encourage you not to check you weight daily, one it will drive you crazy, and two you weight fluctuates for many reasons and tracking it that closely will give you the false sense of failure instead of seeing the progress as a journey. That is why I am reminded not just at the end of a journey to read this scripture but at the beginning. Hebrews 12:1-2 NIV, "and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfector of Faith." Christ is perfect we are not.

Was the new weight loss goal, the new outlook on a problem, the new relationship or maybe the desire to begin a new Bible study all endeavors that never even began? I am going to consolidate the news from committee meetings held in December with the news from January in this article.

SPRC met on 12/12/2023. Unfortunately, there have not been any more applications submitted for the open Children and Youth Director position. This is a problem with many churches in our area. Pastor Bennett spoke to the UMC pastors in Villa Grove and Arcola about a possible merge of youth groups. He contacted the director of connectional ministries for the conference and the suggestion was for Pastor Bennett to move some of his responsibilities that could be handled by the laity of the church to others so he has more time for duties that are being put on the backburner at this time.

Trustees met in December and January and voted to accept the Mediacom contract to provide internet and phone service to the church. The contract provides for two voice over IP phone lines and unlimited I GB service at a cost of \$417/month. Pastor Bennett purchased a new switch and access points and Dave Butler helped with the installation. As of I/29, the work was completed. The trustees voted to donate \$10,000 to the general operating fund of the church from the insurance money remaining from the roof replacement. Pastor Bennett is looking at the cost of a tankless or heat pump water heater for the parsonage after it was discovered the current one was installed in the 1990s. The TCHS band requested the use of the church's round tables for a fundraiser. A motion was made to allow this with a \$100 refundable deposit and the motion passed. The fan in the main men's restroom quit working and was replaced by Leon Kinney. There are doors to the outside of the church that need repaired and Pastor Bennett will contact Bacon and Van Buskirk. Gould has been contracted to clear the parking lots of snow this winter. However, we do not have anyone to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalks. The church does have a working snowblower for this job. If you are interested in performing this service, please contact Pastor Bennett or Bruce Wood.

The **Finance** committee met on 12/18/2023 and on 1/29. There was a surplus of \$25,670 at the end of 2023 of which \$10,000 was donated from the trustees' account. A little over \$1000 in interest for the year was earned from Edward Jones. The Ameren bill in December, 2022 was double the bill from December, 2023 so the installation of the new LED lights has helped to lower the electric bill. New chart of account numbers will be coming in the January, 2024 financial reports which should make them easier to understand. The Church Windows software is working better once more RAM was added to the office computer. However, new accounting software is still being explored by Pastor Bennett and Sarah Evans for possible purchase. The church currently does not have an auditor after Mike Ovca's retirement. The district has requested the audit be completed by March 31. If you know of anyone who might be interested in this position, please contact Pastor Bennett or Dick Berg.

The **Church Council** also met on 1/29 under the helm of new chair, Jim Pattenaude and the following reports were made to the members.

Dave Butler, treasurer, reported for the **Finance** committee. Please see the paragraph above for the information presented to the Council.

Pastor Bennett reported for the **Trustees**. The new phone and internet from Mediacom are working. New networking equipment was purchased and installed by Dave Butler and Pastor Bennett. The office network is separate from the rest of the building and is password protected. There were some shingles lost from the roof recently. Roofs by Rodger was called and they promptly came out and replaced them. Their work is guaranteed so the church is always call them when something is amiss. Please see the previous paragraph regarding more from the trustees' meeting.

New **SPRC** chair, Cheryl Bozarth, reported that their first meeting will be February 13. Wayne Ward will be the new member on the committee.

The **Nominations** committee has two openings for lay members to annual conference. If anyone is interested in attending, please contact Pastor Bennett.

Children's Council will be meeting to discuss Vacation Bible School. There are volunteers willing to help if someone will take charge in planning VBS. There were four TUMC youth who attended the BYG (Big Youth Group) on 1/29 in Champaign. There were eight churches represented by approximately 80 people at the event.

The **Worship** team will be discussing plans for Easter at their next meeting. There will be a Maundy Thursday worship on 3/25 and a Good Friday worship on 3/29. Both of these services will start at 6:00 PM.


UMM had no report.


UWF will be having their Mother-Daughter banquet on April 18 at 6:30 PM.


Dave Butler reported that **SAM pantry** is still searching for a coordinator. This position is responsible for coordinating volunteers and coordinating with the Eastern Illinois Foodbank. The pantry currently only has one person authorized to order food from the foodbank. They are hoping to get an outdoor walk-in refrigerator to place at the west kitchen door.

In the **pastor's report**, Pastor Bennett said that there will be a guest speaker from Cunningham Children's Home on Sunday February 18th as well as a representative from EIU's Wesley Foundation on Sunday April 14th. He will begin advertising for the Children and Youth director again. This position pays \$31,200 per year (\$20/hour). We are 1 of 15 churches in a 100-mile radius looking for a Children and Youth director. It is difficult to share this position with other churches because everyone wants the person to be present on Sunday mornings.

The meeting ended with a discussion of the mission and vision statement. The Church Council authorized Pastor Bennett to form an ad hoc committee to create the statements.
